## MPs engage in comprehensive review of fiscal year 2023/2024 budget to optimize resource allocation and enhance governance

embers of the National Assembly have commenced a rigorous assessment of the national budget for the fiscal year 2023/24, meticulously scrutinizing proposed programs and projects from various state departments and agencies. This process aligns with the provisions of Article 221 of the Constitution of Kenya, which mandates the submission of budget estimates to the National Assembly.


The recently tabled budget estimates, consisting of revenue and expenditure projections for the national government, have been placed before the National Assembly. According to Standing Order 235 of the National Assembly, these estimates are deemed committed to the respective Departmental Committees upon being laid in the House.

Under the current review process, each Departmental Committee is tasked with the responsibility of considering, discussing, and meticulously reviewing the estimates in accordance with its mandate. These committees are then expected to make recommendations to the Budget and Appropriations Committee of the National Assembly.

The country's estimated overall budget is Kshs. 3.6 trillion, which encompasses Kshs. 2.2 trillion allocated to the National Government, Kshs. 986.1 billion for the Consolidated Fund Services, and Kshs. 385 billion for the county government's equitable share.

As the budget review progresses, Lawmakers are paying particular attention to the sectoral budget breakdown, aiming to ensure that resources are allocated in a manner that aligns with national priorities and promotes sustainable development.

The following is a breakdown of the sectoral budget allocations for the fiscal year 2023/24 and their respective share percentages:



These allocations have sparked intense discussions among Legislators, who are actively seeking to ensure that funds are effectively distributed to address key priorities in each sector. The focus lies on optimizing the use of resources to enhance service delivery, stimulate

The review of the budget estimates represents a crucial aspect of parliamentary oversight and democratic governance. By thoroughly examining each department's allocation, the Committees of the National Assembly aim to make evidence-based recommendations to the Budget and Appropriations Committee.

#### Bomet and Garissa residents voice budget priorities: want inclusion in sports academy, tea factory, TVET institutions

Sub-Committee of the Budget and Appropriations Committee in the National Assembly, led by Hon. Florence Jemutiah (Baringo County), organized a consultative forum with the residents of Bomet County. This forum was aimed at gathering their views on the 2023/2024 Budget Estimates.

The event took place at Sasieta High School, Mogogosiek, in Konoin Sub-County, where Bomet residents shared their suggestions to be considered for inclusion in the County's bud-

One of the proposals put forward by the residents of Konoin was the establishment of a resource centre to provide the youth with access Mombasa tea markets. to information through digital or electronic

They also suggested the construction of a multipurpose hall and a sports academy to promote talent development in athletics.

In addition, residents of Konoin emphasized the need for a value addition tea factory in the equip special schools in the region, including region and the establishment of local tea

They questioned why the government couldn't support the marketing of their tea from Bomet, considering its high quality and top rating at the Mombasa auction.

A group representing people living with disabilities appealed to the Committee for funds to

Sasieta small home for the disabled and Korara special school. Water infrastructure and road development were also highlighted as crucial infrastructural projects requiring consideration. The public also raised concerns about the shortage of teachers and classrooms in schools, as well as the lack of support for farmers. The residents further requested the legislators to allocate funds for the upgrading of Longisa Kenya Medical Training Institute (KMTC) branch and the elevation of Sot Technical Institute to a National Polytechnic.

Meanwhile, another sub-committee led by Hon. Mohamed Abdikheir MP (Lafey) held a similar event at the Garissa Library in Garissa Town.

This sub-committee focused on the issues facing Garissa County, with participants representing the six constituen-

The major challenges highlighted by the participants were the lack of water and poor road networks, which were common problems across all six constituencies in the region.

Participants also expressed their concerns about the inadequate infrastructure at Garissa University, the only University in the entire northern region.

# Lamu residents decry poor infrastructure, demand an end to marginalization, during a public participation forum

Residents of Lamu East Constituency have raised concerns about the ongoing marginalization by successive governments, resulting in lack of development projects and limited access to government services.

They argue that despite having a cumulative 120 kilometers of roads; not a single tarmac road exists in the Constituency.

Moreover, they lack connection to the national grid, and their primary and secondary schools are in a dilapidated condition. Additionally, they have expressed dissatisfaction with the absence of boarding schools in primary and secondary schools.

# Marsabit County wants Budget to address stalled projects, insecurity, irrigation and KPRs reinstatement

Residents of Marsabit County have expressed their grievances and dissatisfaction on several stalled projects in the County that require immediate government intervention.

These projects include the Badasa Dam, Marsabit Stadium, construction of Marsabit Judges Residence, Construction of Marsabit Law Courts, Maralal-North Horr road (C77), North Horr-Marsabit Shegel road (C82), Marsabit-Shegel (B7), Shegel-Maikona spur roads and town roads, North Horr-in Darathe AP camp (RD A4), Laisamis-Ngurunit, Kenya Ethiopia (Turbi-Moyale) road, Moyale Technical Training Institute, and Spate irrigation for climate resilience.

The revelations were laid bare during a public participation on the Budget Estimates for the financial year 2023/24 at the Catholic Social Hall in Marsabit County.

They also cited that insecurity in the region has played a significant role in stalling of the projects, urging the government to establish more police posts in the county and reinstate the Kenya Police Reserve (KPR).

The Chair of the Budget and Appropriations Committee Hon. Ndindi Nyoro said public engagements provide communities with the opportunity to influence decisions that directly impact their lives. He emphasized that the committee's role is to balance the various views and concerns gathered across the country.

Obtaining essential documents such as national identification cards, passports, and death certificates has proven difficult for residents due to the remote location of the nearest station, Mukowe town, which can only be reached by sea and is costly to access.

These grievances were presented to the National Assembly's Committee on Budget and Appropriations during a public participation exercise on the budget estimates for the financial year 2023/2024 in Lamu East constituency.

In Lamu West Constituency residents led by their Member of Parliament Hon. Stanley Muthama, expressed concerns about the deteriorating road network, inequitable electricity distribution, and lack of clean water.

They appealed for the construction of modern classrooms to replace mud classrooms, which have caused hardship for students.

Kitui Central MP Makali Mulu, leading the delegation, expressed appreciation for the residents' candid views and assured them that his committee would carefully consider the raised issues and prioritize projects within the allocated budget of 100 million shillings for Lamu County.

# House Committee engages Busia residents on the FY 2023/2024 budget

A delegation of Members from the Budget and Appropriations Committee, led by Teso South MP Hon. Mary Emaase and Tongaren MP Hon. John Chikati, conducted public participation sessions in Akukuranut Hall, Adungosi Ward, Teso South Constituency, and Mtelo Hall, Kapenguria Constituency, to gather input on the budget estimates for the FY 2023/24.

During these sessions, residents expressed their priorities and emphasized the need for projects such as roads, increased budgetary allocation for NGAAF and NG-CDF, the establishment of Cancer Centers, a hospital for infectious diseases, the expansion of Junior Secondary School classes, and the development of an Agricultural Training College.

Additionally, residents requested the completion of KMTC hostels, the construction of Malaba Law Courts, the procurement of police vehicles in Busia County, improved security infrastructure along the Pokot borders, and the implementation of sewerage systems, among other concerns.

In response, Hon. Mary Emaase assured the residents that their views would greatly contribute to the enrichment of the budget process and ultimately have a positive impact on the community.

#### Committee promotes transparency and inclusivity through public participation in Embu

he Departmental Committee on Budget and Appropriations has taken a significant step towards fostering transparency and accountability by conducting public participation sessions on the Budget Estimates for the Financial Year 2023/24. The Committee, chaired by Hon. Ndindi Nyoro (Kiharu), is responsible for the oversight of budgetary matters. The Committee has spearheaded the inclusive initiative, allowing citizens to actively contribute to the legislative process.

Citizens held discussions, raised concerns, and provided valuable feedback on the proposed budgetary allocation.

Among the issues highlighted were the urgent need for the completion of stalled dams, the upgrading of County hospitals, the construction of a County sewer system, along with the expansion of the existing sewer-line network. Citizens also emphasized the importance of renovating market areas, expanding the affordable housing project and upgrading the Runyenjes KCC storage facility into a processing plant.

Furthermore, the citizens emphasized the necessity of constructing new roads and establishing aggregation centers that could later be transformed into industrial parks; fostering economic growth and job creation. In addition, they requested the government to review policies governing the macadamia and coffee sectors, improve electricity connectivity, and provide subsidies on animal feeds, to support agricultural productivity.

The committee said the exercise gives citizens an opportunity to actively contribute to the legislative process, while upholding the principles of democracy by giving them a voice and an opportunity to contribute to decisions that directly impact their lives.

The delegation also paid a courtesy visit to the Embu County Governor, Hon. Cecily Mbarire, who articulately detailed the County's concerns and challenges requiring Government's support.

### Lawmakers discuss Budget allocation and pending bills in Agriculture and Livestock State Departments

'n a recent meeting, Members of including Court Awards to Halal Meats Department of Crops and the State Department of Livestock for the fiscal year 2023/24. The budget, totaling Kshs. 64.6 billion, aims to promote agricultural development, enhance livestock production, and ensure food security and socio-economic growth.

While making the submission, Hon. Mithika Linturi, the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock Development informed the meeting that the State Department of Livestock, responsible for regulating and facilitating livestock production, has been allocated Kshs. 18.35 billion, reflecting a significant increase of 131% compared to the previous fiscal year. Of this amount, Kshs. 8.77 billion is designated for recurrent expenditure, while Kshs. 9.58 billion is allocated for development expenditure. Priority value chains, such as Dairy and Leather are expected to receive a direct allocation of Kshs. 2.9

## Your dress code must adhere to Parliamentary rules and tradition, Speaker tells MPs, Journalists, Guests

ational Assembly Speaker Rt. Hon. (Dr.) Moses Wetang'ula has reminded Members of Parliament, staff as well as visitors and journalists to dress appropriately while within the precincts of Parliament.

Hon. Wetang'ula said the requirement on dress code is a traditional practice that should be observed by everyone accessing the House.

In his communication, the Honourable Speaker said his attention had been drawn to Members attending Committee meetings, activities and House matters while donning attires that are considered inappropriate as per the Speakers Rules.

This, he said, was a deviation from the established decorum of parliamentary dress codes, which are upheld and cherished by parliaments the world over.

"As your Speaker and custodian of the Rules of decorum of the House, it is incumbent upon me to constantly remind Honourable Members of the inescapable imperative to dress appropriately and within the boundaries prescribed in the Speaker's Rules (2017) that are currently in place," said Hon. Wetang'ula.

He told Members of Parliament that the manner of dressing during plenary and Parliamentary Committee meetings is prescribed in Rule 9 of the Speaker's Rules.

The Rule reads: "Members of Parliament, members of the press and guests should not enter the Chamber, Lounge, Dining Room or Committee Rooms without being properly dressed. A proper dress for men means a coat, collar, tie, long-sleeved shirt, long trousers, socks and shoes or service uniform."

And adds, "For the ladies; business, formal or smart casual wear applies. Skirts and dresses should be below knee-length and decent. Sleeveless blouses are prohibited."

The Speaker explained that the prescription of the dress code was deliberately intended to preserve the honour and dignity of the

He pointed out that his predecessors had severally been invited to guide the House on questions of proper dress code, particularly in plenary and in committees.

He recalled how in the 10th Parliament, the Late Hon. Jakoyo Midiwo invited the Speaker to guide on a question of proper dress code and whether the prescription should be flexed to allow alternative attire, including national or cultural attire, to which the then speaker made an elaborate ruling.

The Rule, he said, not only applies to the Chamber alone but also to Committee sittings, the Lounges as well as all Dining ar-

Hon. Wetang'ula further referenced a request from 12th Parliament where Kisumu West MP, Hon. John Olago Aluoch, sought the Speaker's guidance on the matter of appropriate dress code for Members in the Committees.

In that instance, the Speaker guided that it is in the interest of Members that whenever they appear in the House or its committees, they do so in decorous attire

befitting their stature as legislators and that of Parliament as an institution.

"I hasten to restate that whenever the House finds a member to be improperly dressed, the Chair will not hesitate to enforce strict adherence to proper dressing."

He further added: "Honourable Members, I am not about to drop the guard in so far as enforcing the subsisting Speaker's Rules on Dress Code is concerned. As a matter of fact, observance of proper dress code by Members helps to maintain the decorum and dignity of the National Assembly as an August House."

He noted that he was making the guidance with the understanding that by virtue of the high office of a Member of Parliament in the society, Honourable Members are expected to lead by example and uphold the highest standards of conduct.

He further directed Chairpersons of Committees to enforce the Speaker's Rules in their respective Committee meetings and activities, just as he does in the Chamber.

#### Ministry plans to introduce virtual weighbridges in a bid to tame delays and corruption along the Northern Corridor; PS EAC affairs tells House Team

The Ministry of East African Community (EAC), Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASALs) and Regional Development, is set to incorporate the use of virtual weighbridges in order to increase transparency and accountability in weighbridges operations across the Northern corridor.

This is according to the Principal Secretary of EAC affairs, Abdi Dubart, who appeared before the National Assembly's Committee on Regional

Integration to give responses regarding issues affecting trade in EAC bloc.

In a consultative session that was chaired by the Committee Vice-chair Hon. Farah Salah (Fafi), the Members wanted to know how the Ministry is addressing the delays and corruption at weighbridges in the Northern corridor.

'What are the measures the government has put in place to increase transparency and help reduce delays and corruption in the weighbridges along the Northern corridor?," Hon. Salah asked on behalf of the Committee Members.

In his response, PS Dubart disclosed to the Members that the Ministry had adopted diverse measures to tackle the menace which the MPs now say, have made potential transit countries shy away from using the corridor.

"To address trucks delay at weighbridges, we have started construction and operationalization of virtual weighbridges. This is an innovative idea that integrates ICT platforms in weighing of trucks," Mr. Dubart told the committee.

According to the PS, the use of ICT in facilitating weighing of trucks has been found more efficient, transparent and accountable. "Although virtual weighbridges are not yet rolled out across the country, its adoption will ensure transparency, accountability and will help reduce corruption incidences," he said.

To ensure that the corridor continues to be the corridor of choice for businesses in the region, PS Dubart, told members that the Ministry is in collaboration with KeNHA, police and KRA to address delays and guarantee security of cargo in transit.



## Legislators query financial discrepancies in the Kenya Water Institute budget tabled before them for scrutiny

he National Assembly's Departmental Committee on Blue Economy, Water and Irrigation has concluded its Budget deliberations with the State Department for Water and Sanitation.

The Cabinet Secretary for Water, Sanitation and Irrigation Hon. Alice Wahome and her Principal Secretary Dr. Kipronoh Ronoh appeared before the Committee to defend their budget estimates for the next Financial Year 2023/2024 tabled before it.

The Committee led by Hon. David Bowen (Marakwet East) raised a red flag on the Kenya Water Institute's (KEWI) financial discrepancies noting with concern that Kshs.125 million was disbursed to the institution but only Kshs.60 million was recorded in the budget estimates.

The Members called on the department to explain the crumbling blocks in KEWI's management and operations stating that the institution has a significant history of producing diligent water Engineers and should uphold its reputation for the foreseeable future. "KEWI needs to be audited, its one of the best institutes but its future is in jeopardy," said Hon. Nzengu.

In her response, Hon Wahome explained to the Committee that the Ministry is aware of the 'needle in the haystack' but they are trying to mitigate measures to curb the adversity.

Hon. Bowen recommended that the Ministry reallocates funds to stalled projects in order to complete them instead of having alot of projects that are either not being funded or are new.

"If a project is not being funded, remove it from the list projects earmarked for funding. Give money to projects that are nearing completion. The Nairobi City Regeneration project has only about Kshs.500 million left to be completed,

why are you not allocating money to it so that it is completed?" posed Hon. Bowen.

The CS informed the Committee that Kshs.16.84 billion has been allocated to 11 significant projects in the upcoming fiscal year to advance the Bottom-Up agenda.

The legislators raised concerns about the Ministry's allocation of funds for monitoring and evaluation, questioning the necessity of such allocation when the Ministry already has an adequate staff whose responsibilities should encompass that task.

"Why are you allocating Kshs.75 million to monitoring and evaluation of projects, yet you have sufficient staff and they should be more than competent to carry out that role?" posed Hon. Nzengu.

The Committee expressed dissatisfaction with

the overall allocation of funds to projects that not only lack a clear purpose but could be better utilized for other initiatives that would directly impact Kenyans' lives.

PS Ronoh assurred to the Committee that the Ministry will adhere to its budget limits and find a suitable method to allocate funds to essential projects.

The Chairperson observed that there are redundant projects between the State Department of Water and Sanitation and the State Department for Blue Economy and Fisheries, particularly concerning the development of fish landing sites like Ngomeni and Kichwa Cha Kati.

He emphasized the need to address this oversight issue and consolidate these efforts under a single State Department for better synergy.

The lawmakers also highlighted the imbalance in project distribution throughout the country. They noted that despite the prevalence of drought in Northern Kenya, a significant portion of funding is not concentrated there.

They added that this raises the question of why the tangible effects of these projects are not evident on the

Furthermore, it suggests that the equitable allocation of resources to other regions should have been consid-

Hon. Bowen urged the Ministry to adopt a strategic approach in their operations and project management, considering the essential nature of water throughout the entire country.

The Committee assured the Ministry that once they receive the requested documents and clarifications, they will be able to provide a well-informed recommendation to the House that aligns with the best interests of the country and the well-being of Kenyan citizens.

#### Determine your JSS Teacher needs before recruiting, Committee tells TSC

Parliamentary committee has asked the Teachers Service Commission (TSC) to come-up with a clear formula for determining the number of tutors that are needed for Junior Secondary Schools (JSS).

National Assembly Education Committee chairperson, Hon Julius Melly (Tinderet) who spoke during a meeting with TSC boss Nancy Macharia, also asked the Commission to ensure the

process is conducted in a free and fair manner.

This was after Dr Macharia told the legislators that the commission plans to recruit 20,000 more teachers on contract in the financial year starting July to shore up Junior Secondary School (JSS) numbers, but added that the number will still fall short of what is needed.

"It will be important for the commission to devise a clear formula for determining the number of teachers that are required to be deployed tutors" said Hon Melly during the meeting where county and sub-county level offices. the TSC boss made a presentation on the agency's nancial year 2023/2024.

She also explained that commission needs Kshs.2.2 billion for teacher promotion and a further Kshs. 2.1 billion for their professional development programs, while Kshs.300 million will be in JSS, so that we address the acute shortage of used to fund programs and activities at the Commission's

Dr. Belio told the lawmakers that the department requires an additional Kshs.43.1 billion, that will be channeled to underfunded areas that are critical to the achievement of the agency's mandate.

PS Inyangala in her submission said the state agency needs an additional Kshs.32.7 billion for its development activities. From the amount, Kshs.20.35 billion will go to funding HELB, completion of stalled university projects (Kshs.10 billion) and establishment of an Open University (Kshs.1.41Billion)
